Finally, I make a plea for you to pay the 2022 annual dues of \$25.00. 

**New Texas law changes rules for accessible parking for disabled veterans**

Disabled veteran's license plates, also referred to as DV plates, will no longer be sufficient by themselves to legally park in accessible parking spaces starting Jan. 1, 2022, according to [Senate Bill 792](#), which was signed into law by Gov. Greg Abbott in May.

Texas law will require all vehicles with DV plates parked in an Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) accessible parking space to also display a placard with the International Symbol of Access (ISA).

Starting Dec. 1, under this new law, the Texas Department of Motor Vehicles will no longer automatically issue disability placards with DV plates. A note with a doctor's signature will be required to obtain a placard.

Starting Jan. 1, 2022, to park in an ADA parking space requires either a new DV license plate with the ISA or a non-expired DV plate along with a current parking placard.

While all of the new legislation that was passed and signed during the 87th Texas Legislature went into effect on Sept. 1, disabled veterans have a few more months before this law is enforced.

"Nothing changed for DV plateholders on Sept. 1, 2021. They may still park in disabled parking spaces until Jan. 1, 2022," said a spokesperson for the TXDMV.

According to the Texas DMV, "placard and plate eligibility is based on a medical condition that meets the legal definition of a disability" which includes the following:

-Visual acuity of 20/200 or less in the better eye with correcting lenses.

-Visual acuity of more than 20/200 but with a limited field of vision in which the widest diameter of the visual field subtends an angle of 20 degrees or less.

-Mobility problems that substantially impair a person's ability to move around; these problems can be caused by:

- Paralysis.
- Lung disease.
- Uses portable oxygen
- Cardiac deficiency.
- Wheelchair confinement.
- Arthritis, neurological, or orthopedic condition, or foot disorder.

Other medical conditions causing a person to use a brace, cane, crutch or other assistive device.

As of August 2021, disabled veterans in Texas have registered 403,000 vehicles with DV plates, according to the Texas Department of Motor Vehicles.

Using the parking placard or a license plate with ISA to park in an accessible parking space is only allowed when the person with the disability is utilizing the space, or the disabled person is being driven by another person.

**VP– Membership continued.**

People who misuse disabled parking placards are subject to fines of up to \$1,250 and/or up to 50 hours of community service, according to the TXDMV.

Vehicles with DV plates are still exempt from paying parking fees collected through meters that are charged by a governmental authority other than a branch of the federal government.

## Medicare Part B Rates Will Spike. Here's What You'll Pay

Medicare Part B premiums will rise by the highest level in the program's history next year, with most Part B users paying 14.5% more than they did in 2021.

The Standard Part B 2022 premium of \$170.10 is up from \$148.50 in 2021. This is the monthly amount paid by beneficiaries who had a modified gross adjusted income of \$91,000 or less on their 2020 individual tax return or \$182,000 or less on a 2020 joint return.

The increase dwarfs last year's 2.7% standard rate hike. A Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) fact sheet offers three main reasons for the increase: Rising health care prices and utilization as patients return to provider offices for routine care while COVID-related expenses persist, a \$3-permonth increase brought about by a legislative fix that lessened last year's increase during the COVID-19 pandemic, and uncertainty regarding costs and coverage of Aduhelm, a new Alzheimer's medication.

Those who earned more pay an adjusted rate for Part B coverage by adding an Income Related Monthly Adjustment Amount (IRMAA) to the standard premium. The breakdown of those rates, per Medicare.gov, is as follows (Note: as with the standard premium levels, these income levels have risen slightly since 2020):

- Those with income from \$91,001 to \$114,000 on an individual return or from \$182,001 to \$228,000 on a joint return will pay **\$238.10** per month, up from \$207.90 in 2021.
- Those with income from \$114,001 to \$142,000 on an individual return or from \$228,001 to \$284,000 on a joint return will pay **\$340.20** per month, up from \$297.00.
- Those with income from \$142,001 to \$170,000 on an individual return or from \$284,001 to \$340,000 on a joint return will pay **\$442.30** per month, up from \$386.10.
- Those with income from \$170,001 to \$500,000 on an individual return, or \$91,001 to \$408,999 when married but filing a separate tax return, or from \$340,001 to \$750,000 on a joint return will pay **\$544.30** per month, up from \$475.20.
- Those with income above \$500,000 on an individual return, or above \$408,999 when married but filing a separate tax return, or above \$750,000 on a joint return will pay **\$578.30** per month, up from \$504.90.

### Income Adjustment

If your income figures from 2020 don't reflect your current financial situation, especially in the event of a retirement, a divorce, or other life-changing events, you may qualify for a lower rate. You can file Form SSA-44, Medicare IncomeRelated Monthly Adjustment Amount – Life Changing Event or visit your local Social Security office to request an adjustment.

Qualifying events include:

- Work stoppage or reduction.
- Loss of income-producing property.
- Loss of pension income.
- Employer settlement payment.

**LTC Ginger Simonson. USA (Ret)**

For many of us, the new year brings both uncertainty and hope. Discussions about COVID, the Texas Electric Grid, and US relations with Russia and China are fraught with uncertainty. As a perpetual optimist, I start the New Year with hope that we, as a MOAA Chapter and as a Country, can find new ways to reconnect and to work effectively together to make things better. I also pray that we learn to actively listen to everyone who speaks and to try to understand their point of view, whether or not we are inclined to agree with them or not.

Texans will head to the polls this year to elect an entire slate of Texas office holders from the Governor, all 31 State Senators, all 150 State Representatives, as well as a host of Judges, clerks, and constables. You can find the entire list of all the positions at this link -

The Primary Elections are scheduled for March 1st, 2022, and Election Day will be held on November 2nd, 2022. There is some uncertainty about the date for the Primary Elections, due to legal challenges to the newly drawn State District Voting Maps that the Governor signed into law on Oct. 25, 2021. The US Department of Justice (DOJ) is suing to overturn the state's congressional map. The suit requests that elections under the new maps be prohibited until "new plans that comply with Section 2 of the Voting Rights Act" are devised. If the federal judiciary denies DOJ's claims, Texas' elections will proceed as normal. However, if a judge finds merit in the lawsuit, it is unclear how elections will proceed as the suit works its way through the appeals process. Besides a delay in primaries, the courts may decide that some of the districts were drawn in violation of Federal Voting Law, raising the possibility of a ruling to redraw the district maps. The possibilities make my head hurt.

My advice - Proceed as if the Primaries will be held on March 1st, but don't be surprised if a court ruling upends that date. And, if you plan to use an mail-in ballot to vote, make sure you request an application for a ballot at your County Election website and return it by Friday, February 18, 2022.





On Dec 27, President Joe Biden signed into law the National Defense Authorization Act, or NDAA, for fiscal year 2022, which authorizes \$768 billion in defense spending. Texas will reap a fair amount of funding and benefits from the FY 2022 NDAA, including:

\$362.4 million for military construction projects in Texas (including a new barracks at Fort Hood, an Ambulatory Care Center and an Aircraft Corrosion Control facility at Joint Base San Antonio, and a Child Development Center at Sheppard Air Force Base))

85 new F-35 Joint Strike Fighters (built in Fort Worth)

\$183 million for vehicle rollover mitigation kits (that are installed at the Red River Army Depot)

\$42 million for the Department of Defense's STARBASE program in Austin, Houston, San Angelo, and San Antonio, which encourages students to explore STEM opportunities with military personnel

Funds for the B-21 Long Range Strike Bomber (which will be flown out of Dyess Air Force Base in Abilene)

Additionally, general NDAA provisions, will benefit troops and families who are stationed at the 15 active-duty military installations in Texas:

Increased funding for Impact Aid by \$70 million to support schools educating military children, and especially those with severe disabilities. ■

Supports family readiness by ensuring access to high-quality childcare on military bases.

Raises pay by 2.7%

### News About VA Benefits

The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) has begun processing service-connected disability claims for six new presumptive conditions related to environmental exposures during military service. They added bladder cancer, hypothyroidism, and Parkinsonism to the list of medical conditions presumptively associated with exposure to Agent Orange. A few months later VA added asthma, rhinitis, and sinusitis (to include rhinosinusitis) on a presumptive basis, based on particulate matter exposures during military service in Southwest Asia and certain other areas.

Any Veteran who was previously denied service-connection for any of these six conditions but had symptoms manifest within 10 years of military service would need to file a supplemental claim. Be sure to use [VA Form 20-0995, Decision Review Request: Supplemental Claim](#) when filing. The claim form should include the name of the condition and specify that the condition is being claimed due to in-service exposure to environmental hazards.

## Treasurer's Report

### Greetings from the Finance Department

Happy New Year to each of you. Here's hoping you aren't one out of the 30% test takers who are testing positive for you know what. Well, if you are I wish you a speedy recovery and also hope you are over it in 72 hours like the folks we know who have gotten you know what...

I apologize but because I'm that guy I have to make a plea to those of you who haven't gotten around to submitting your 2021 dues. BTW it is 2022 now. There are about 30 members who let it slip last year. Please write that \$25 check so we can maintain the health of our chapter and continue to serve in this way. Thank you very much. If you would like to avoid all this brow beating at the end of this year, feel free to make that check out for \$50 and be done with it for 2022. If you are really interested in not being hounded for a while, just make the check out for \$70 and you will be current for 2021, 2022 and 2023. For those who are current, 2022 dues of \$25 and discounted 2023 dues of \$20 can be paid any time now. Those who paid 2023 dues before December 31, 2022 will be entered into a drawing for free 2024 membership at the February meeting so you might want to wait to see if you win this prestigious prize.

Thank you again for supporting the Chapter. I would like to highlight a couple changes in the tax code for 2021. This is for those of you who still keep receipts in a shoe box and buy new pencils for tax season. There are major changes in the Child Tax Credit. I know many of us tend to act like children from time to time but that doesn't qualify. Also, those of you who use software or tax preparers probably don't have to worry about these details...

### **Standard Deduction.**

The IRS increased the standard deduction for filing 2021 returns.

For married couples filing jointly, the standard deduction increased from \$24,800 in 2020 to \$25,100 for 2021 tax returns. For single taxpayers and married individuals filing separately, the standard deduction increased from \$12,400 to \$12,550. For heads of households, the standard deduction increased from \$18,650 to \$18,800.

We also have the option of manually itemizing deductions. I would encourage you sharp pencil shoe box folks to run the numbers both ways to see which method produces the lower tax bill.


### **Charitable Giving**

The Taxpayer Certainty and Disaster Tax Relief Act allows for a charitable contribution deduction. Individuals, including married individuals filing separate returns, can claim a deduction of up to \$300 for cash contributions made to qualifying charities during 2021. The maximum deduction has increased to \$600 for married individuals filing joint returns. The gift must have been made via cash, check, credit or debit card and go directly to the charity.
