3rd Vice President Legislative Affairs and Community Activities LTC Ginger Simonson, USA Retired



The 87th session of the Texas Legislature kicked off on 12 January. Things seem to be moving slowly as leaders figured out how to operate in a pandemic environment. However, both the Senate and House laid out their initial budget proposals – both coming in around \$119.7 billion and both about \$7B over the current revenue stream projected by Comptroller, Glenn Hegar. The Legislature will find ways to pass a balanced budget by the end of the session, as required by the Texas Constitution.

One of the other important issues that the Texas Senate addressed was committee membership. I was pleased to see Senator Donna Campbell reinstated as the chair. Senator Campbell is a military & first responder "brat" and has been a major legislative champion for Veterans. I think they are a great group: a number are Veterans themselves and several others have worked on advocating for Veterans Mental Health issues and criminal justice reform. I've attached the profiles of all the committee members on our MOAA website. The House has yet to release committee assignments and neither chamber has any Veteran related committee meetings posted on the Texas Legislative Online website as of 22 January.

As of 22 January, legislators have introduced over 1760 bills and passed 7. One of the bills that is worthy of support is HB 408 which expands opportunities for Veterans to get into Veterans Treatment Court Programs. You can read the bill's contents here:

Another bill I believe is worthy of strong support is HB 1092, filed by Representative Romero, Tarrant County. You can read it here - <https://capitol.texas.gov/BillLookup/Text.aspx?LegSess=87R&Bill=HB1092>

The intent of the bill is for jails to do a better job of identifying incarcerated Veterans and allowing them to get peer and claims support so they can receive the benefits they earned. I was involved with several members of the Military Veteran Peer Network who gave a presentation on Justice Involved Veterans to Rep. Romero's Legislative Manager and we are all appreciative of their efforts to improve the lives of Veterans and their families in Texas. What's Up in Congress

At the federal level, proceedings are in a bit of a flux in the Senate as leaders work through a power-sharing agreement necessitated by a fifty-fifty split in the number of Democratic versus Republican members. The good news is that the Senate has confirmed a number of President Biden's Cabinet and staff picks. They approved President Biden's nominee to lead the Pentagon, paving the way for retired General Lloyd Austin to make history as the nation's first Black secretary of Defense.

And that brings me to this month's legislative action items. Presumably due to membership changes in Congress because of recent elections, the official MOAA website has not yet set up the automatic email feature that sends advocacy requests to our elected representatives. However, MOAA has laid out our National Legislative Priorities. I've listed them below.

- Achieve Equity of Benefits, Protections and Administrative Support for Guard/Reserve Members Consistent with Their Active-Duty Counterparts
- Sustain Veterans Health Administration (VHA) Foundational Missions and Services
- Protect Arlington National Cemetery as an Option for Those Currently Eligible to Receive Full Military Honors, Through Expansion of Our National Cemetery
- Sustain Pay Raises for Servicemembers and COLA Raises for Retirees
- Improve Survivor Benefits
- Ensure the Coast Guard Receives Pay During a Government Shutdown

Key Bills:

Federal - HR 5995

A bill to amend title 10, United States Code, to expand eligibility to certain military retirees for concurrent receipt of veterans' disability compensation and retired pay or combat-related special compensation, and for other purposes.

Federal - HR 413

A bill to amend the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 to allow the work opportunity credit to small businesses which hire individuals who are members of the Ready Reserve or National Guard, and for other purposes.

Federal - HR 847

A bill to provide interim appropriations for the Coast Guard Retired Serviceman's Family Protection and Survivor Benefits Plans for each fiscal year after fiscal year 2018, and for other purposes.





Veteran Spotlight — With a Twist

I'd like to tell you about a military Veteran and long-term resident of Denton County. After graduating from a high school in America's Heartland, this Veteran-to-be enlisted in the US military. Although he was only 17, he took to military life and spent 21 years serving our country. After attaining the grade of E-8, he retired in 1977, settling his family in our area. He spent the rest of his working life in the insurance industry. He was living peacefully in retirement when things started to go awry. Sadly, he was diagnosed with dementia and progressively got worse. Many of you may know that dementia is a cruel disease, which ultimately robs you of your identity and your life. You may also know that people with dementia may sometimes behave in ways that are physically or verbally aggressive.

Unfortunately, this Veteran was arrested on two separate family assault charges and currently sits without bond in a local jail. I'm not sure what you will think about this situation, but I am having a hard time believing that jail is the best solution for this Veteran or his family. Fortunately, because the Military Veteran Peer Network has an active Justice Involved Veterans Program, there is hope that this Veteran will soon be out of jail and in an appropriate long-term care facility.

I wanted to share this story for a few reasons. First, there are an increasing number of incarcerated seniors making it an emergent policy issue. This article sheds light on the issue:

Secondly, it personalizes Texas HB 1092 which I discussed in the Legislative section. Veterans make up about 8% of the prison/jail population and many have mental-health issues related to their service. Being able to identify these Veterans as early as possible and connecting them to their earned federal and state benefits greatly lessens their chances of growing old in jail.

Finally, I think it's important to reach out for support when you need it, rather than letting things get to a crisis point. It is possible that the Veteran I described above may never have been arrested, if his family had been connected with community resources to assess the threats of dementia and find a different solution. We, as retired Veterans, have access to many benefits to help us deal with the effects of aging. For example, Texas has affordable State Veterans homes with memory care accommodations. Additionally, VA offers a host of geriatric services for elderly Veterans: <https://www.va.gov/geriatrics/>.

Overseas Coupon Effort Start to Finish

The eight year overseas coupon effort has sent 944,568 coupons in 247 packages to commissaries across the globe.

The Chapter's overseas coupon effort is ending at this time for a number of reasons. Over the years the number of bases accepting coupons has decreased due to base closings. Some bases received too many coupons to handle and opted out of the program. More service organizations participate decreasing the need. There are fewer coupons available. Fewer Chapter members are getting the Sunday paper in print form. The number of coupons in the Sunday paper is decreasing. Now that the Chapter isn't meeting, the number of coupons received is very small.

To summarize the history of this effort, in 2012 the Chapter sent just over 1700 coupons to the Incirlik Air Base, Turkey the first month. At one time the Chapter mailed 16,000 coupons a month. The Chapter's last packages had just 2000 coupons. Our efforts have come full circle. In the early years there was a requirement to count the number of coupons and the dollar amount. Chapter members we often heard saying that even if only half the coupons were used the impact was significant.

In 2015 we began rotating coupon donations to many bases in Europe and Asia. In 2016 the need to count the coupons ended making this effort much easier. The number of coupons sent was an estimate based on previous experience. The volume remained near previous totals with the impact spread worldwide until this year when the number of available coupons dropped significantly. The numbers from all 8 years are in the table below. Please note the Chapter paid the postage.

Surviving Spouse

The virtual chapter for Surviving Spouses held their quarterly meeting via zoom on 1/19. There is no cost to be a member of this chapter. You can attend the meeting either by a toll free phone number or zoom. Why wait for old news? Think about joining, and then do it. It is easy, go to our chapter web site, click on resources, then surviving spouses where you will find a link to a membership form.

At the January meeting the MOAA Survivor Programs Committee goals were outlined as follows.:

-Improve Dependency and Indemnity Compensation (DIC).

- Establish DIC equity with other federal survivor benefits.
- Increase DIC payable to survivors of catastrophically disabled veterans to match other
- Federal survivor benefit plans. Improve the speed of adjudicating and granting DIC to survivors of deaths caused by service-connected disability.

-Improve the Death Gratuity:

- Change the name of the Death Gratuity to more accurately reflect intent and sensitivity.
- Secure a minimum of 50% of the Death Gratuity for Defense Enrollment Eligibility Reporting System (DEERS) eligible spouses.

-Retain survivor benefits upon remarriage

-Authorize survivors of retirees to draw full month's retired pay for the month in which retirees die.

-Increase VA Survivors' Death Pension linking death pension benefits to the federal poverty level determined each year by the Department of Health & Human Services.

-Increase lending protections for uniformed service members, veterans, survivors and family members.

-Authorize an open enrollment period for the Survivor Benefit Plan.

-COVID-19 Related: Ensure that the VA takes a closer look at death certificates when the cause of death is COVID-19 to ensure the deceased veteran does not have an underlying service-connected health condition that could have been exacerbated by COVID-19.

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
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
